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250 INNER CITY KIDS ATTEND AMAHL PERFORMANCE

UP NEXT: DON GIOVANNI

Chelsea Opera presents its first two-act opera, *Don Giovanni*, by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart on May 16-19. Opera lovers and music professionals agree this is the world's most perfect opera. **Maestro Carmine**

Aufiero explains why he believes that is true: "Don Giovanni represents a perfect synthesis of text (poetry), music, drama, and philosophy. The characters exist together

in the world of the story unfolding on the stage in front of our eyes as well as in our unconscious. The music and drama reinforce each other's impact on both our outer and inner sensibilities in a way that very few other works of art can."

One of Don Giovanni conquests is Donna Elvira. After only three days of marriage, he has abandoned her. Still, she continues to chase after him. We asked **Anna Niedbala** (who returns for her 2nd engagement with Chelsea Opera) what



drives this woman. "Elvira is all too human, ashamed of what has happened to her. Through her torment, she focuses her energy on trying to 'save' others from the same fate. Yet, no matter

what her rational mind tells her, her heart still aches for him, hoping he will realize that she is the special one who has enough love to save him from himself."

The Mozart/DaPonte opera is deeply rooted in the legend of "Don Juan," notably dramatized by Tirso de Molina [1584-1648] and "The Stone Guest," a popular folk tale. People were familiar with various versions of the stories, thanks to numerous touring Commedia dell'Arte troupes as well as plays by Molière among others.

How does one portray Don Giovanni, the symbol of the ultimate seducer?

Peter Kim, cast in the title role, explains: "Don Giovanni is considered 'evil' because we do not approve of his actions, especially his treatment of women. But I think he



believes he is simply misunderstood and his self-righteousness enables him to face the consequences without shame. The first step to capturing the essence of his character is to accept him as a person who has extreme needs."
